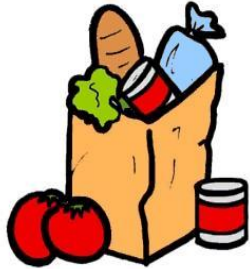

Friends, do you ever find yourself at a loss for words? I do, more often than I would like to admit. But when we turn to God we realize that He is the only truth we can know for certain. He is for us, He is with us, and He will see us through whatever it is we are facing. We live in a fallen world, which means that things are not always going to be easy.

Holy Spirit is here to help us weather the storms of life, not to remove the storms completely. There is growth that happens in the storm. Roots grow deeper and stronger as they are nourished by the rain. Because Holy Spirit has the ability to be everywhere all the time we can be assured that He is with each of us, every moment of every day. That saying, "Sometimes He calms the storm and sometimes He calms His child" is beautiful and brings hope into our lives.

Friends, whatever the storm you are facing, I want you to know that I am here for you. I don't have the magic words to "fix" anything, but I will accompany you in the storm and do my best to cover you with the umbrella of prayer. You are not alone! Holy Spirit is with you, I am with you, and your church family is with you! Hold tight to the promises of God, dive into the Word of God so that you can grow in your faith, prayerfully go before the Lord, and friends, you will find the firm foundation you are searching for.

“Seasons Have to Do With Planning”

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven (Ecclesiastes 3:1).

Brothers and sisters in Christ, as I am writing this article for you for the month of March; this week in February has been so cold that I am yearning for warmer weather, in other words, I am ready for spring. As I get older and older, I notice more and more that my bones hurt more with the cold weather of winter. Springtime is one of my favorite seasons of the year; because everything is fresh, new, and in bloom. Changing seasons can teach us spiritual lessons. God’s nature is revealed in his created world and we are to learn about Him through the world he has created, including seasons.

I would like to share about the Hispanic ministry in our church that has to do with seasons and planning. As Methodists we have been taught to plan in advance regarding ministry, projects and programs. In Casa de Oracion, our Hispanic group which is composed of a few nationalities of Latinos; within this group, there is a small laity leadership group. Every year in November and December we meet to plan on a “Action Discipleship plan” for the following year about how to reach out to Latinos within the community of Dodge City and beyond. This is a process of prayer and discernment; evaluating the outcomes of last year’s “Action discipleship Plan in order to plan for the coming year. I want to say that this “Action discipleship Plan” has to do with planning and seasons. Why? Well simply because some of the activities included in it are better performed in certain seasons of the year; in other words, there are certain activities more appropriate to be implemented. For instance, outdoors activities of reach out in public places are more successful during the summer when people of the community visit those public places because the weather is more appropriate.



There is a beautiful hymn in our Methodist hymnal named “**Hymn of Promise**” UMH#707. I would like to share a verse of this hymn with you:
verse 1. In the bulb there is a flow-er; in the seed an apple tree; in co-coons, a hidden promise: but-ter-flies will soon be free! In the cold and snow and win-ter there’s a spring that waits to be Un-re-vealed un-til its sea-son something God alone can see.
I love this hymn so much because it always has blessed me in a very special way.

So what are the spiritual lessons to be learned from seasons of life? God’s faithfulness is the first lesson that we need to learn from the changing seasons. Sometimes we take for granted that spring follows winter, and summer follows spring,...etc. What have we done to bring about this change in seasons? Absolutely nothing! Because God by the power of His might keeps it directly on course. So perfectly in fact that each season comes in due course. That is none other than the perfect faithfulness of our God. We can rely upon Him as the firm foundation for our feet and more faithful than the changing seasons.

God’s mercy and love to us His children is new every morning. There is never a time that God’s love and mercy is out of season, or dries and shrivels up; it is new to us with every passing day.

Brothers and sisters, every season of the year has different opportunities for us to witness of the love of God, full of wonderful promises contain in his Holy Word (The Bible). As spring and summer approach, let us prepare the soil of our hearts to bring fruit for the kingdom of God in every season of the year. Amen!

OBITUARY

Jerry Milford Rumbaugh, 84, passed away with family by his side on January 28, 2025, at Manor of the Plains in Dodge City, KS. After enduring a long battle with Alzheimer's and Dementia, Jerry was finally able to rest in the arms of his Savior and remember fondly all the days that had been made hazy. Born to Edith (Roach) and Milford Rumbaugh of Agra, KS on May 9, 1940, Jerry was known as a kind and determined young man. He attended Agra Public Schools, followed by Brown Mackie College. On June 3, 1962, he married his lifetime love, Joyce (Maley) Rumbaugh and they began building their family, including three children, Jeffrey, Jason and Jennifer while living in Meade, KS. Those three kids were the pride and joy of Jerry's life for many years. He served in the Army Reserves from January of 1963 through

March of 1968. Jerry was the head administrator for CMS in Meade, KS for 20 years and then for the DS&O in Solomon, KS, retiring in 1997.

Although kept busy with his job, Jerry also enjoyed woodworking and carving, model trains, traveling, and camping. His three grandchildren, Tanner, Lauren and Blake, joined the family and quickly brought new joy to his life. In 1996, Jerry suffered a Traumatic Brain Injury due to a fall. He recovered to an extent further than what most expected and continued to enjoy life to the fullest.

Jerry had many passions in life, but none bigger than being around his family. No matter the occasion, or the travel time required to get there, he and Joyce were there for all occasions in any family member's life. Those he loved never had to wonder, because he was there to show them how special they were to him. Not only was he the best Brother, Husband, Dad and Grandpa, he was the textbook definition of a good man. He was strong, loyal, kind, smart, funny, protective, compassionate, and an excellent example of how to love Jesus and your neighbor. He was often referred to as an optimist; always seeing the positive in whatever situation he was given. And in his own inconspicuous way, he was continually lifting people up and challenging those around him to be better or try harder in all things.

The last few years have been hard for us all to watch Jerry slowly slip away and become less and less like himself. But we know it was even harder for him to not remember or not know. Regardless, he never lost that smile that lit up the room when he saw family. He may not have remembered all our names, but we know that deep down he knew exactly who we were. Jerry would put on that big grin and simply say "I'm just glad to see these kids and get to be around them." He will live on in the best parts of each of us and will still be there for every moment, watching from the best seat.

He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Joyce Rumbaugh of Dodge City, KS; son, Jeff (Lisa) Rumbaugh of Dodge City, KS; daughter, Jennifer Rumbaugh of Manhattan, KS; three grandchildren, Tanner (Samantha) Rumbaugh of Dodge City, KS, Lauren (Spencer) Bromm of Craig, NE, and Blake Rumbaugh of Dodge City, KS and step-grandson Vinnie (Erin) Lyman of Salina, KS; three great-grandchildren, Emery and Cayson Rumbaugh of Dodge City, KS and step-great-grandson Jack Buschman of Perryton, TX; sisters Pat (Richard) Kessler of Glendale, AZ, and Sandi (Jim) Winchell of Almena, KS; and many nieces and nephews.

He is preceded in death by his parents; brother, Richard Rumbaugh; son, Jason Rumbaugh; and granddaughter-in-law Rachel Rumbaugh. Memorial service will be held at Swaim Funeral Chapel on Saturday February 15, 2025 at 11:00 AM with Rev. Berniece Ludlum presiding. A family burial will be held at a later date. Memorials are suggested to Alzheimer's Association in care of the funeral home.

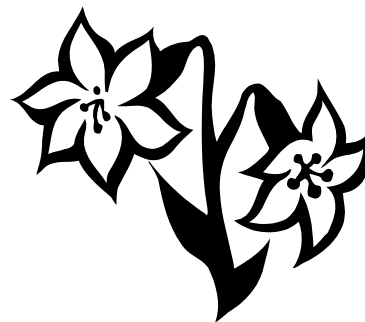

BOARD MINUTES

February 10, 2025

6:30 p.m.

Fellowship Hall and ZOOM

Chairperson Kyle Parker called meeting to order at 6:33 p.m. He welcomed everyone to the One Board meeting. He asked Rev Berniece for opening prayer. She offered a prayer for guidance in our time of need.

ATTENDANCE: Sign-up sheet - 13

13 in person, Kyle Parker, Doug Austen, Connie Penick, Marcy Taylor, Kacee Richards, Kathy Ramsour, Matt Gerard, Joe Finley, Daniel Rivera, Rev Berniece Ludlum, Rev Juan Espinoza, Jaime Hernandez, and Lisa Rumbaugh.

Minutes of the January 13, 2025 meeting were presented. **Kacee Richards moved to accept the minutes presented. Lisa Rumbaugh second. Motion carried.** The minutes will be printed in the INK newsletter beginning in March. In the future the minutes will be sent to all members of the Board via email.

Doug Austen presented financial reports for First United Methodist Church and FUMA – Joy Child Development. He also included copies of reports for budget, endowment, scholarship, and investment. Following his review of findings, he will continue to work on simplification for better reporting of the financial position. He verified expenses were high due to annual payments due in January; Investment holding; giving was down due to weather and cancellation of Sunday service. There are several increases reflected in the budget and a review shows regular giving is down. Regarding the financial for Joy! He will do a review of the last three years to develop a trend and report next meeting. Currently Joy! Child Care is operating at a loss, money is tight. Following a Q & A session **Kacee moved to accept the financial reports as presented. Lisa second. Motion carried.**

Chairperson Kyle Parker reported research had been completed on securing an outside firm to conduct an audit. During lengthy discussion based on other churches with similar budgets, availability of audit firm, and the requirements of church business **Joe Finley moved to secure the firm of Kennedy & McKee to conduct a complete and intense audit. Marcy Taylor second. Motion carried.**

Doug will work on developing a procedural manual with policies established. Rev Berniece will contact the auditor and schedule the date.

The kitchen has been cleared and is open for operation as of February 10, 2025. The expense has been great and there are still some hurdles to cross regarding the fire suppression and alarm to be connected to Joy!

Rev Berniece reported United Wireless has been installed. However, there is still the issue of outdated equipment. Currently getting bids for phones and obtaining a few at a time. Joy! Classrooms are required to have a landline. There are additional issues with the security cameras and placement. Kyle will reach out to the president of DC3 for consultation since the college has had similar issues.

Kyle reviewed the list of long-term issues. He noted there are a couple of items to be decided and time to move on. The church sign located to the south needs to be 1) taken out, 2) replaced, or 3) use what is still working. Following lengthy discussion regarding usefulness, expense and maintenance,

and several suggestions, it was the consensus of the members present that they would use the third option; 3) use what is still working.

Kathy Ramsour has reached out to a local car dealer for information on cost and availability to replace the current church van. Rev Juan is of the opinion that the van is still working and will last awhile longer. He will continue to monitor and be aware. No rush at this time.

The number one priority is the church building. Joe has been in touch with various people and it is highly recommended to obtain an architect to review the roof, foundation, window, and boiler issues for the leaking water throughout the building. He indicated there would be an expense for the inspection and recommendation report.

Regarding the lights in the sanctuary, it will be necessary to research the expense for LED lighting.

The bellows in the HVAC must be repaired as soon as possible. Kyle will reach out for bids.

The kitchen that Joy! used in the past will be demolished at a later date.

The suggestion of a water softener will be discussed at the same time as the issues of the boiler.

It has been noted if the ceiling fans in the sanctuary would be set earlier by Marshal the issue of being too hot in the upstairs area would be resolved.

Brief mention of the Joy! Playground, east side. Lisa reported the unit in the classroom was of bigger concern. It is broken and unable to be used due to safety. Jacob is willing to take apart and clear it out of the room.

Lisa Rumbaugh reported there has been a lot of sickness of children and staff. As of this meeting they are starting to recover and return. The classrooms are full and the newborns are arriving.

Rev Juan reported on attendance at the Congregation Care Seminar in Garden City. Several members of the congregation and Casa represented Dodge City Methodist Church. He noted new members attending and interested in leadership. He continues training for Lay people to build the future. He is trusting the Lord to provide what is needed. The question of immigration was addressed. He indicated the bishop has established the Immigration Task Force to help understand the process of ICE.

The Maintenance position is being defined. There is a clear need for specific duties to be outlined. A meeting will be established with Marshal to discuss the duties and responsibilities. He needs to be empowered to act upon needs and report on a regular basis. Topics include job description, a maintenance email account, and a filing system for recording building maintenance.

Rev Berniece reported the Congregation Care training sessions were beneficial. Signage will be provided to let people know about care opportunities of the congregation i.e. prayer cards distributed, care package for families with a death.

Additional topics for consideration: Kacee asked about the Community Rewards through Dillons.

Rev Berniece will follow up on getting it set up.

Doug received the information on the eligibility for historic tax credits. He will follow up and report.

The next board meeting is scheduled for Monday, March 10, 2025, 6:30 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Rev Juan closed with prayer of thanks and encouragement.

There being no other business the meeting was adjourned at 8:27 p.m.

Each church within the Great Plains Conference of the United Methodist Church is asked each year to support the ministry of the United Methodist Church through our Ministry and Mission fund. For 2025, that “apportionment” for First United Methodist Church of Dodge City is \$84,108.00

The Final Results are in for the Sack Hunger Food Drive recently concluded. Our congregation donated 424 pounds of food which was distributed to Genesis Food Pantry here in Dodge City. Our contribution was added to that of the Conferences of both teams resulting in a total of 178,179 pounds. This is a great illustration of what we can do together as United Methodists as God’s hands here on earth.
